Extinguishing of the Last Candle

Earthquake

All may depart in silence.

Since the fourth century, Christians have observed a solemn service known as **Tenebrae** or **darkening**. After each scripture reading, a candle is extinguished, symbolic of the flight and denial of the disciples and friends of Jesus away from the crucifixion. In our service, you will also hear the pounding of nails, symbolizing the crucifixion. The extinguishing of the central **Christus** candle signifies the death of Jesus Christ. A harsh sound called the **strepitus** is symbolic of the earthquake at the death of Jesus, and the emptiness and confusion which exists in a life without Christ. The "strepitus" in this service is more elaborate in the form of an improvisation for timpani, suspended cymbals and organ.
